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
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


St. Mary of the Mount Octoberfest Fun;

St. Sylvester LOC Host Third Fair Trade Sale

Partnered with Janet Berna the Catholic Relief Services Fair Trade Ambassador for the Pittsburgh Diocese, St. Sylvester Ladies of Charity hosted it's third Fair Trade Sale at their parish. Items for sale were from around the world and included scarves, baskets, and Christmas ornaments. There were also crosses made from re-purposed car engines and wall hangings from Haiti made of repurposed oil drums, as well as coffee, chocolate and other food products. Items from Thistle Farms, a Tennessee organization helping with the rescue of women from sex trafficking were included in this sale.

Information on the work of Catholic Relief Services and the Human Thread Campaign was also on hand for distribution. The Human Thread Campaign is petitioning retailers like Macy's and Kohl's to carry fair trade clothing.

Hosting a Fair Trade Sale is not only a fundraiser, but provides a good educational program on Catholic Social Teaching.

MOST HOLY NAME OF JESUS/ST. ALOYSIUS MAKE GOOD USE OF HAGER GRANT

PIZZA FOR BREAKFAST - Fresh off the grill was provided for those waiting for their distributions from the Catholic Community Food Bank of Troy Hill. While people ate their pizza and waited for their food, Kathy Croft and the Ladies of Charity of Most Holy Name of Jesus and St. Aloysius demonstrated creative and nutritious meals that could be made using the items and fresh produce from the Farmer's Market that was in their food bank bags. The ladies also shared home canning tips for strawberry jam, spiced apples and tomatoes with basil. The items for the canning were donated by a generous neighbor, a busy mother of five children who grows the vegetables in her home garden "just like her grandmother did". Instead of carving her pumpkins, this creative woman paints the faces on the Jack O'Lantern with markers so it stays fresh. It can then be baked and pureed for use in pies and muffins. This activity was made possible through the Hager Grant that this LOC group applied for last March and awarded from the National Board in April.

The goals of this project are to build relationships with people living in poverty, demonstrate innovative ways to use the food bank items and to make sure they know that their ACCESS card can be used at the Farmer's Market. A trip to the Farmer's Market was organized by Kathy. Transportation was provided. Two gentlemen on the trip discovered that they could purchase tokens using their ACCESS card. They went home with zucchini, tomatoes, lettuce and potatoes and said they would continue shopping at the Farmer's Market until it's closing on the day after Thanksgiving.

The women are planning another demonstration in February, tentatively for Mexican cuisine.







ST. ALEXIS LADIES OF CHARITY 25 YEARS OF SERVICE





Under the guidance of Father Richard Wesoloski in February, 1991 seven ladies joined together to establish the Ladies of Charity in St. Alexis Parish. The original members were Kathy Connell, Anita DeFrancesco, Carolyn Gaus, Ruth Lorensen, Roseanne Sirianni, Marian Stack and Mary Zangrille. The group has now grown to thirty-four members. Sadly, Rose Sirianni passed away last March.

Over the past 25 years St. Alexis LOC has helped many of our neighbors. Because of the generous donations to their Poor Box they have been able to provide emergency rent, utility assistance, and help with prescriptions and food to those who needed a hand up. Since 1993 they have distributed over 25,500 gifts from their annual Sharing Tree. This project has been lead by Anita DeFrancesco. Anita received the Priddy Award from Family Links in recognition of her work with them through the Sharing Tree. Fifty-seven families were helped in 2015 by Thanksgiving and Lenten food drives, and Easter baskets for the children.

Since 2004 the ladies have supported "Jesus in Disguise," an Aspinwall based ministry to the homeless. There is a continuous collection of blankets, clothing, and canned goods etc. Sandy Cognetti and Ruth Chiappa solicited donations from local merchants, schools, neighbors and parishoners and purchased 200 sleeping bags, blankets, comforters and food gift cards for the "Jesus in Disguise" ministry.

On a lighter note, for a number of years the ladies have been dying eggs and contributing candy filled plastic eggs for the annual North Side Children's Easter Egg Hunt held in West Park. The St. Alexis members are not sure who enjoys this activity more, the members of the LOC or the children hunting the eggs.

Building on their 25 year foundation, the St. Alexis LOC look forward to many more years of serving in the Vincentian spirit of "To serve rather than be served with humility, simplicity and charity."

The residents enjoy refreshments, a fruit basket and winning prizes at the bingo games.


A Prayer Ministry unites several of the Ladies by praying the rosary each month with the residents of the L.G.A.R. Home in Turtle Creek. They also assist at a monthly Mass celebrated for the residents at the Brinton Towers of Braddock Hills. A prayer service for deceased members of Good Shepherd Parish is conducted at the funeral home and the ladies are also available to assist at the Funeral Masses.

The Card Ministry is administered by the Ladies who send a card to shut-in/nursing home residents of the Parish with greetings on their birthdays and holidays throughout the year.

The children are not forgotten and are part of Good Shepherd's Literacy Ministry. A Literacy Luncheon chaired by Kathy Blazina is held each year in May for the children of the East Catholic School Consortium. Kathy develops a theme and arranges the decorations. A free book is provided for each child. The Ladies have lunch with the children who are very pleased by the event and feel very important. Pictures from the Literacy Luncheon are shown below.

Also, a bible is presented to parents by the Literacy Ministry when their baby is baptized.

Along with attending Cemetery Sunday the ladies also attend the All Soul's Day of Remembrance at Braddock Catholic Cemetery.



(P.O.W.E.R) are the recipients of the Power Wrap Project of Madonna/Word of God Ladies of Charity. Cosmetics, Lotions, Shampoos, Tissue, Stationery, and many other donations from both parishes, Delta Kappa Gamma Sorority, and other sources are individually wrapped and approximately 25–30 gift bags are assembled with one of each item for the women who reside at the Power House Home in Swissvale. This may be the only Christmas gift some of these women receive and they love opening the individual presents.
