IMPORTANT INFORMATION **AND FOR SOME A WAKE UP CALL**

The article below contains information that was given by our President, Bernadette Jaketic, in her January/February's President's Letter. She asked that your president's share her information with all their members, but since a lot of associations are not meeting at this time we thought it best to put it in this newsletter that you should all be receiving.

Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, [love] is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails.

I have used this scripture the last couple of years in my President's Letter and find it pertinent yet again this year. In this scripture, St. Paul tells us what love is and is not. The challenging thing to do is to replace the word 'love' or the pronoun referring to love with your name. When doing so, it is a good barometer as to how well we may or may not be living according to the word of God....both as individuals and as Ladies of Charity. We, the Executive Board, have been hearing, yet again, of Ladies of Charity associations not wanting to work with other Ladies of Charity associations within their parish grouping. We also hear of groups not wanting to merge treasuries with those in their parish grouping once the parishes within a grouping merge. Quite honestly, the Executive Board will not support activity of this nature. We must be in union with one another. We have explained on more than one occasion that under the 501 (C)(3) guidelines, once a parish grouping has merged, there will be one Ladies of Charity Association for each parish with one treasury bearing the name of that Association (i.e. Association of the Ladies of Charity, Sts. Martha and Mary Parish).

By working together within our parish associations, so much more can be accomplished by working together. While it is understandable that some treasuries (pre-merger) may have been bequeathed sizeable donations for the use by the Ladies of Charity, so be it. As a merged grouping, you now have the ability to impact the lives of so many more parishioners or so many more individuals within your communities, particularly if one of the areas in your merged parish is less affluent than others.

Without the risk of sounding political, which this is not meant to be, there is more than enough division in our society as a whole. Let us be different...let us be a light in the darkness...let us be a reflection of St. Vincent de Paul...let us be Ladies of Charity....to those we serve and to one another.

There are many ways of merging LOC groups. You do not necessarily have to travel to other areas for your meetings. A number of our groups are holding two/three different meeting times at separate locations. If this is being done, we recommend that the leaders of each meeting meet before hand and plan the agenda. The agendas should be the same for all meetings held at individual sites. Activities that each group always had can be brought to your entire membership and all members should have the option of choosing which activities they want to join. This and other issues can all be worked out. Our Transition Team is available to assist you with pulling your groups together.

Dear Members:

It is with deep regret that the Board of the Ladies of Charity Caregiving, Inc. announces the suspension of its operations at our branch office in Pittsburgh PA, effective February 28, 2021. We wish to thank you for your prayers and support which enabled us to create this extraordinary initiative.

Since selecting Pittsburgh as the pilot location in late 2018, we established a non-profit corporation, securing federal tax exempt status, established funding, honed our marketing strategies, developed a staffing model, a training program, and a mentoring program for the caregivers, established relationships with regulators, accountants, bankers, billing, payroll and human resource services and health care consultants. We secured licenses, hired staff and trained our employees and caregivers. The Pittsburgh Ladies of Charity Diocesan Association provided much support and the Caregiving Advisory Committee in Pittsburgh assisted our staff in the design and implementation of our goals. We looked forward to expansion to Kansas City and working with the enthusiastic Ladies there.

However, COVID-19 slowed our growth, substantially forcing the suspension of operations until the business environment is more accommodating of small businesses like ours. Our unique model is *more than just care*, more than a business. We are rooted in a faith tradition and a 400-year charism that mandates a commitment to our neighbors in need. Caregiving is our "calling." Through training, we assure that our employees are mission orientated and provide the highest level of competent care. Ladies of Charity Caregiving is a licensed home care agency, complemented by volunteers who mentor our caregivers and offer spiritual and social activities for our clients. Additionally, we offer a sliding scale fee for persons who are not insured and need financial assistance. We have received accolades from clients, families of clients, as well as caregivers who experienced a dignified work environment and the support of volunteer mentors.

COVID has caused us to pause, but it also is clearly directing future initiatives to respond to the desire of older adults and those with disabilities to stay at home. It is accelerating the demand for programs that will respond to these needs and is demonstrating that such care is not only healthier for individuals, families and society it is also cost effective. The Board of Ladies of Charity Caregiving is determined to be a part of this systemic change. Our [website](#) will have current information on our status.



Shawls are given free of charge however, donations to the Prayer Shawl Ministry are greatly appreciated.

As a matter of fact, you don’t even need to know how to knit or crochet to join the group! Finishing the shawls at our meetings involve tying on religious symbols and praying with us for all the past year’s recipients of our shawls. To date we have made over 1500 shawls since this ministry began in the Spring of 2006.

INVEST THEIR 1ST JR. LADIES OF CHARITY



Our Lady of Mount Carmel (OLMC) Parish recently completed formation of its first Junior Ladies of Charity (JLOC) chapter. Leading the efforts were Ladies of Charity (LOC) members Mary Ellen O'Boyle, Moderator, and Co-Moderators Ann Hoyson and Rhonda Matt.



Beginning in early 2020, while preparing for their Investiture, the girls crafted Valentine-themed candy jars, then Easter cards for food bank recipients. Plans to offer face-painting for the Parish's Lenten Fish Fry needed to be canceled due to the pandemic.

An Investiture Ceremony was conducted on August 30, 2020, during the 11:00 am Sunday Liturgy. Celebrant Father Michael Zavage and Diocesan LOC representative Mary Diaddigo led the formal altar initiation ceremony in which six high school girls were invested. Each girl received a blessed LOC cross and after the ceremony, each girl was gifted her official JLOC membership card and a white rose. Newly invested JLOC members are Katelyn Baker, Caileigh Duffy, Emily Koman, Brenda Fay Kunkel, Olivia Marché and Katharine Rose McGoey. Madison Grace Hartung who was to be invested this year was unavailable on this date. She will be in the next class of investees.

This group continues to grow. Three more interested girls have started attending the OLMC LOC meetings and the Pittsburgh Diocesan Board has given the ok for the girls from OLMC to welcome girls of other Pittsburgh parishes who do not have Ladies of Charity to join the OLMC group. This is an option also for other Jr. LOC groups throughout the diocese to bring other members into their associations.

Although the pandemic has added challenges to meeting the JLOC mission, the girls have been very active. They donated thirty-five home-crafted photo/card holders to Vincentian Nursing Home. Sent Thanksgiving cards with personal notes to the parish homebound. For Christmas, they created a beautiful Christmas video to be shown to the residents of the North Hills Health and Rehabilitation Center in Wexford. This was their way of making as personal a visit to the residents as they were allowed due to the pandemic. They also decorated the windows and outside trees and bushes of this facility for their enjoyment while seated in the dining hall.

THREE LOC GROUPS WORKING TOGETHER

NOW HOLY FAMILY LADIES OF CHARITY

PANDEMIC BEWARE! You'll NEVER stifle the "spirit of giving" by loving Ladies of Charity. One such example, the "parish associations of St. Irinaeus, St. John the Baptist & St. Joseph" coming together to be the parish association of the newly named diocesan Holy Family Parish serving the areas of Oakmont, Plum and Verona, where busy hands and devout hearts continue to carry on the work of the Lord.

During the Christmas season, these sister ladies delivered to Seneca Place, a nearby UPMC skilled nursing facility, over 400 "cards of cheer" that the staff delivered to the residents during this period of confinement. For Valentine's Day, the sister ladies topped that by delivering over 800 Valentine's to six nearby nursing facilities; namely, UPMC's the "Willows", "Westminster", "Seneca Place," "Seneca Manor", as well as Concordia at Ridgewood and Oakmont Center.

On a very cold January Saturday morning, these same sister ladies brought their donations of food to the St. John's parking lot where items were being collected for delivery that day to the "Red Door" Warming Center site hosted by Catholic Charities. The following statements tell the unfolding story.

Quoting from Cathy Hammel (STI) ... "Great success ... ladies were so eager to help ... (quota of 120 sandwiches achieved early on) but sandwiches and snacks kept coming in ... cases of water, Pepsi, hats, gloves, scarves ... fantastic!"

Cindy Vento (SJB) proclaimed ... "what an amazing event ... it was an honor to be someone who got to deliver the donations."

Liz Opice (SJV) favorably added ... "was heartwarming ... everyone agreed it was nice to do a project our three associations could work on together ... will be terrific when pandemic is over and we're truly functioning as one

Upon their designated 10:30 AM arrival at the Red Door, Cathy and Cindy spotted already huddled on the sidewalk a handful of guests waiting in line. By the time they unloaded the donation of 200 sandwiches, 150 snacks and other goodies, the line had grown to over a dozen - still a full half hour before the doors would open to serve them. A most eventful and enlightening day it was - volunteers from Central Catholic were providing soup; and the Center announced, that due to the extreme temperatures, it had received enough plentiful amounts of donations to serve extra meals. What a welcoming relief it must have been to those coming in from the cold.

In closing, one last eloquent comment from one of the sister ladies ... "I think we can accomplish anything we put our minds and hearts to!" And that, my dear sister ladies, applies to each and every one of you no matter where you reside in this beautiful world.




THE EMERGENCY FUND FOR THE ELDELY

The Ladies of Charity have a long tradition of personal service to the elderly. However, there are many times when financial aid is needed. That's where the Emergency Trust comes in.

The Emergency Trust is sponsored and supported by the Committee of One Hundred of the Ladies of Charity. The fund was established to provide the "little bit extra" to the needy aged that spells the difference between the bare existence and dignified living.

The fund is administered by the Ladies of Charity in conjunction with the Bishop of Pittsburgh, with assistance from many of those working in the parish social services ministry throughout the diocese.

The fund is a last resort after all other available means of help have been exhausted. The Ladies of Charity fund is not meant to substitute for any other



WHO WILL IT HELP

The Ladies of Charity fund will help the aged poor, persons who have worked all their lives, are now on a fixed income and find it difficult to adjust to this sudden loss of financial stability. They do not know where to turn and are too proud to ask for help. Because their limited resources may exceed bureaucratic guidelines, they often do not qualify for help from governmental programs and services.

This fund is for any over 55 person that may need assistance. They do not have to be Catholic, a member of your parish or a Lady of Charity. Anyone in the Pittsburgh and surrounding areas is available apply for assistance.
